The first Caring, Helpful Amazing People (CHAMPs) Awards, took place on Thursday 23 November 2023 on Carers Rights Day, recognising unpaid carers for their hard work, kindness and resilience, the awards also recognised the professionals and services that offer help to unpaid carers in Hull.

Julie Bahn, Service Manager, Carers Information and Support Service, CHCP CIC who organised and hosted the event on behalf of Hull's Carers Partnership Board said: "Working on the CHAMPs awards has been an absolute privilege.



A discussion within the Carers Partnership Board meeting and a suggestion from one of the members who has lived experience as a carer led to collaboration and consultation with carers in Hull, resulting in an award ceremony named by carers themselves."

Julie advised "We know that often it is difficult for people to recognise themselves as a carer as the support they give to a loved one increases over time. However, by shining a light on carers in Hull and celebrating the amazing contributions they make, we hope to help others to identity as a carer and access support too.

The CHAMPs took place in the prestigious banqueting suite of the Guildhall where 100 invited guests enjoyed a sparkling reception and an afternoon tea,

Director of Adult Social Services, Tracy Meyerhoff provided the opening words to start the award ceremony which recognised carers from six nominated categories and a final award to the Carer of the Year.

Adult Unpaid Carer Award



We received nominations for adult unpaid carer who provide care for someone who couldn't manage without their help and support, putting the needs of the cared for first and themselves last. We received lots of nominations from family members and friends who felt their person deserved to be recognised for the dedication and commitment to their loved one.

Adult unpaid Carer winner - Pam Kelsey - Pam was nominated by Beryl. Pam takes care of her son and parents. She doesn't hesitate to help her friends when needed. When thinking of how caring Pam is, I am really in awe. Caring for one person can be hard work, but 3 - I just don't know how she does it.

Parent Carer Award



This category we received nominations for those carers who are providing a parenting role, caring for a member of their family who are under the age of 18 and have additional needs, a disability, or a long-term illness to highlight the fantastic role they provide.

Carer of the Year Award

They give the illusion it's not hard and they can cope – we are our own worst enemies. The CHAMPS for me is giving carers the recognition they would never ask for but definitely deserve."
